Man-on-man surfing competition first starts at the Stubbies Surf Contest at Burleigh Heads.	<b>1977</b>

Local man who won the surfing World Championship in 1978 and was awarded the Order of Australia medal for his contribution to surfing.	Wayne 'Rabbit' Bartholomew
